- 13. Give one example of foreshadowing.
- 14. Explain the following quotes and their importance:
  - a. "What I mean is . . . maybe it's only us" -Simon (Chapter 5)
  - b. "Ralph wept for the end of innocence, the darkness of man's heart, and the fall through the air of a true, wise friend called Piggy." (Chapter 12)
  - c. "You're a beast and a swine and a bloody, bloody thief." -Ralph to Jack (Chapter 11)
